RE: Non-Credit Parenting (NCP) Enrollment, 2014-15 (Kaiser)

Overview

Students who registered for Non-Credit Parenting (NCP) courses in 2014-15 were identified to determine their course enrollment patterns and demographic characteristics (refer to Methodology section for sections included). There were 236 students who enrolled in at least one NCP course, making up a total enrollment of 290. Table 1 shows that less than one-fourth of NCP students enrolled in two or more NCP courses in 2014-15 (18%). Less than 1% of NCP students enrolled in a credit course during the same time period.

Enrollment in NCP 402 accounted for almost half of NCP enrollment in 2014-15 (47%) while NCP 403 students represented another one-third (34%). Not all NCP courses were offered every term. Appendix 1 shows the enrollment data at the course, section and term levels.

The majority of NCP students were one-course takers, enrolling in only one section in 2014-15 (81%) (Table 3).

Table 4 shows the combination of NCP courses in which students enrolled. Almost all the students enrolled in only one NCP course (92%). The most common NCP course combination was enrollment in NCP 400 and NCP 402 (6%). Note that these data does not show the number of sections in which students enrolled, as a student could be enrolled in multiple sections of one NCP course.

The credit courses taken by the two NCP students span seven departments, making up an enrollment of seven (Table 5). These courses were all in the social sciences, except for ART and COMM.

Students successfully completed slightly more than half their credit courses. One student enrolled in a COMM course but was unsuccessful while a second student completed two-thirds of her/his courses (Table 6).

Demographic disaggregation shows that an overwhelming majority of students enrolled in NCP courses are female (71%) while slightly over one-fourth is male (28%) (Table 4).

Ethnicity data shows that students are overwhelmingly Latino/a (74%), while Asians/Filipino/Pacific Islanders compose the second highest represented student group (17%) (Table 8).

The educational level of students is inconclusive as over half of the students are Special Admit/Unknown (57%) (Table 9). Despite the limited data, 20% of students report earning an AA/AS degree or higher while roughly another one-fourth have attained a high school diploma or equivalent (22%).

Methodology

NCP courses are non-credit and no final grade is awarded. These are non-transcriptable courses. Students were identified by enrollment in NCP courses in 2014-15 with a registration code of RA, RE, RW. Students with no contact hours recorded were excluded from this analysis. Twenty-two students had multiple education levels reported; the highest reported educational level was counted in this analysis. The following sections were included in this analysis: Summer 2014: NCP 403 CRN 10848, 10849; Fall 2014: NCP 400 CRN 21637, 21639; Winter 2015: NCP 400 31744; NCP 402 CRN 31747, 31749, 31742, 31743, 32128; Spring 2015: NCP 402 CRN 42429, 42076, 42375.
